Well Decommissioning Cost-share

An abandoned water well can pose a serious safety concern if not properly sealed. Since all water wells provide a path from the surface directly to an aguifer, unused wells can allow pollutants to enter our groundwater. The Lower Big Blue Natural Resources District (LBBNRD) has cost-share available to landowners who have an unused well to decommission. The Lower Big Blue NRD will provide cost share in the amount of 60% of the actual cost to decommission a well, up to \$500 (this does not include the cost of pump or tower removal.) In order to be eligible for cost share, the well must be decommissioned by a licensed well driller or pump installer. Applicants will need to submit the well decommissioning form which is available from our office or on our website. In addition, original receipts, W-9 and a copy of the Notice of Water Well Decommissioning as submitted to the Nebraska Department of Natural Resources. Cost-share is available on a first-come, firstserved basis.



Flow Meter Cost-share

Any landowner in the district may apply for flow meter cost-share on an existing well. All new and replacement wells are required to have a flow meter installed and are also eligible for the program.



Cost-share is paid at a rate of 50% up to \$500. All you need to do is fill out a cost share form and provide us with a w-9 form and a copy of the paid invoice for the meter. Cost-share is limited to two flow meters per land owner per calendar year. Additionally, cost-share is paid to the owner of the parcel where the meter is installed.

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Watershed Dams: The Silent Protector

This year has been one for the books when it comes to moisture. Spring rains and snow melt pushed rivers out of their banks and covered thousands of acres with water, silt, and sand. Recreation areas like Harlan and Milford were filled to capacity. Luckily, the Lower Big Blue was spared from major flooding. District staff have been closely monitoring our floodwater retention structures. These structures provide 98,000 acre-feet of flood control, holding water which would otherwise inundate homes, roads and fields. On October 1st, roughly five inches of rain fell on parts of the district. That amount of rain over a short period caused a significant amount of
